
Mentally III Wait in ER By Kayla B.

Some of the reasons that people are admitted to the ER aren't due to injury or physical illness; they include eating disorders, self injury, and depression. Julie Appleby wrote an article for USA Today about how long mentally ill patients have to wait in the ER. The majority of psychiatric patients who need mental health care wait in the ER for hours.

When psychiatric patients enter the ER they have many specific needs. Unfortunately, most ER's don't have mental health professionals, and psychiatric hospitals have

fewer and fewer beds. Kelly Larsen a SASS worker said, "Psychiatric patients are put into a specialized psychiatric room that is often times locked to maintain the safety of the client and others. This could mean a long wait through the process of evaluation and being admitted." Kelly also said that once a hospital is determined it could easily be a 4-6 hour process.

Fewer psychiatric hospitals are available each day; some hospitals don't have enough psychiatric staff and they have to close down. USA TODAY gave many hospitals






Natural Disaster Leaves More than 60,000 Dead

An area of 9,326,410 square kilometers and a population of 1,330,044,605, combined with a destructive earthquake is a certain recipe for disaster.

Monday, May 12, 2008 was a fairly ordinary day for the region of Sichuan, China. People were coming and going busily to work and school in cars, on bikes, and on buses.

About midday, normality turned to destruction. An earthquake, an abrupt movement in the earth's crust caused by the friction of tectonic plates,




with a 7.9 magnitude, struck eastern Sichuan, China. The earthquake that devastated China happened to be the worst earthquake that country had seen

In a statement she made a couple months ago, she said she wanted to better Argentina as a whole. She is hoping to make a new path for women in government.

One woman has already run for and won president; her name is Mary McAleese and she the eighth president of Ireland. She was born in Belfast, Ireland on June 27th, 1951. She went to Trinity University Law School. And then taught there as a professor before leaving to become a journalist, she returned a few

years later, and became a director at the school. After she married her husband and had three kids, she was elected President and has been serving for eleven years. People agree that she has done wonderful things for Ireland.

Another great woman leader who is no longer with us, is Benazir Bhutto. Benazir was born on June 21st, 1953 in Karachi, Pakistan. She later went to college at age 16 at Harvard's Radcliffe College. in 30 years.

Stephen Evans, an earthquake survivor interviewed on The Today Show, spoke of his experience. Evans is from the US; he moved to China where he has a wife and a child. He teaches English to Middle school kids, and, while at work, he felt "one small jolt" to begin with. Then Monday, May 12th, turned into a disaster. Kids were overcome by panic, but everyone got out safely with only a few injuries. Evans waited eight strenuous hours to be reunited with his wife and child.

Tuesday looked equally bad, if not worse. The devastating aftermath took a toll of more than 60,000 lives. Buildings, houses, and schools, which were fully assembled less than 24 hours before now lay in piles of rubble. Screams could be heard from underneath the rubble containing concrete slabs, dirt, and metal.

Rescue teams searched the wreckage for signs of life while victim's loved ones crouched next to piles of rubble, burning incense and praying that survivors would be

found. Others mourned their losses.

Civilians were quite traumatized by this event. Some waited for news of survivors, others couldn't sleep; they were terrified that more earthquakes would occur.

The Chinese government promptly sent out soldiers the day the earthquake struck. Instant noodles, rice and cookies were being passed out. Many people were happy with the way the earthquake's events were handled. Others were not.

After the earthquake, the truth loomed that deaths could have been prevented if the buildings were up to code. Thousands of students were crushed and trapped in the rubble of schools because the buildings literally crumbled.

"I am particularly saddened by the number of students and children affected by this tragedy," said President Bush in a statement made to CNN. com.

On June 6th, the U.S. held a meeting for the Department of Defense, which President Bush attended. It was determined

that the earthquake left nearly 10 million people poverty stricken, 5 million homeless, 374,171 people injured, 17,469 missing, and 46.25 million people affected, according to a United States Government webpage.

Some of the primary focuses of the US government's aid were directed towards the injured, the homeless, and people in need of psychological assistance. In addition, supplies and rescue troops were sent to China.

Two Months Later; Where is China?

It has been about two months since the traumatic earthquake in China. Many might wonder what is being done to rebuild and how people are handling the losses of their loved ones.

Not everything is going well; many people have built memorials around the rubble to honor their loved ones, especially deceased children and students that died in poorly built school buildings. Many of these memorials have been destroyed and smashed when not carefully watched. Many parents and family members of lost loved ones protested the memorials being smashed. Some were taken into police custody.

"We're dispirited. Our children have been dead for a month. The memorial plaque is broken and reporters have been chased away. I'm 40. All our hopes were in our children. Now they're dead. Our future is dead, too," said Chen Yen a volunteer helping raise money and rebuild the area, being interviewed by CBS2NEWS.com.

Some things, the Chinese government is doing are positive. Each day, rubble is being cleaned up and new buildings with improved structures are being built. Some high school seniors are back in the classroom for their 12-hour days, so they can go to college. The government is also focusing on the issue of homelessness. trying to feed and accommodate people everyday.





Shoplifting Increases

Wherever you go, whether it's the gas station or the grocery store, prices are getting higher and higher. People already have trouble working harder to keep up with monthly bills. Not everyone can afford to go to the store and get everything they need because they have just enough to keep up each month. The tighter the budgets are, the more people will be tempted to use the

five-finger discount so they won't have to spend. Many people are in a financial dilemma. Retail theft costs companies about \$40 billion a year, sometimes even more and shoplifters are responsible for \$15 to \$30 billion in retail losses each year.

According to Shoplifters Anonymous, there are many different types of shoplifters, a lot of the time they are just amateurs. They can be really good at stealing and some steal everyday, but they don't do it for a living. Professional shoplifters steal so they can make a living by selling the stolen items; some sell them online, some work in teams or use some sort of distraction so their plan works out. There are the sketchier professionals who will usually be intimidating, forceful, and do the grab-and-run tactic.

Kidshealth.org states that in the US, there are 23 million shoplifters; over 2 million are children who could face a life of crime. Half of the adult shoplifters started in high school. More than a third of children know other children who shoplift, and more than half the children have friends who shoplift. About 90% of the population has shoplifted at least once in their life. Almost half of the high school population has shoplifted within the past year. Shoplifting affects people of all different ages, genders, races, cultures, and backgrounds.

Remember, shoplifting is also taking shopping carts, or finding ways just to pay less for items.

Sixwise.com says a lot of the time shoplifters don't get caught, in fact a majority of them have only gotten caught 1 out of the 48 times they have shoplifted. Some will even steal a few items and then get in line and buy a few things to seem less suspicious.

The consequences of

shoplifting, also called petty theft, not only affect the store and the shoplifter, they also affect other customers, because then they have to pay more for their items. It also gives teens an even worse reputation, because teenagers are seen as more likely to shoplift.

For businesses, the consequences include losses of revenue and establishing bag checks, or leave your bag at the door when you enter the store, and security systems like cameras, tags, alarms, and guards.

People shoplift for many different reasons. The feeling of getting away with something is more of the reason that people shoplift than their stolen reward. It's an addiction. Shoplifters sometimes steal because they have other things going on in their life and need to cope, and that's how they

deal with their problems, by shoplifting.

Most shoplifters only steal from certain places. You could have a friend over who shoplifts, and leave them alone in your room and they won't take anything. Or, if you drop a 20 dollar bill, they may pick it up and give it to you. They only shoplift; that is the only crime they commit.

The legal consequences of shoplifting usually depend on the circumstances; consequences for a repeat offender may be different for someone who got caught for the first time, or someone who stole an expensive item. When the item is no more than \$500, the shoplifter will generally be charged with a petty crime misdemeanor. In some cases the first time offense could be shortened to probation. It all depends on how much they stole and how much the stolen items were worth. Repeat offenses may result in felony charges. The overall legal consequences are some jail time, community service hours, and fines.

In the case of minors, when caught, most shoplifters are usually banned from coming back to the store they stole from. Most of the time the teen's parents will get informed by the police station right away that their child was caught stealing. If it's their first offense, the station will turn them back over to their parents and then the courts decide what the teen's punishment is going to be.

Even after they get caught, it's still hard for them to stop and sometimes they will do it again without thinking of the harsher consequences they would receive if they were to get caught again.

a survey. The results showed that 61% of hospitals do not have mental health staff to care for the mentally ill patients who wait in the ER. The survey was based on the American Hospital Association, a total of 5,700 community hospitals with psychiatric units showed that in 2000 there were 1,425 beds and in 2006 there were 1,309. According to USA TODAY Bruce Schwartz from Monefiore Medical Center in NY Said "For individuals in need of admission because they're psychotic or severely depressed, it can be a very uncomfortable, scary, disorienting time." (USA TODAY)

One O'School student said that of their stays in the ER, the shortest was "2 hours and the longest was 18 (hours long)". Another student said that their shortest stay in the ER was "4 hours and the longest was 21 hours."

As to how they were treated at the hospital, the first student said, "It depended. Some people treated me like I was an alien. There was one nurse who was especially nice." The second student said, "I was left by myself for the majority of the time and I just waited for around 20 hours." These students felt set apart from the other patients in the ER. "They basically wouldn't leave me alone and I got nasty stares," said Student 1, and Student 2 said, "I seemed to be getting considered to be lowered priority than patients there who



were at the ER for physical reasons."

The survey given by USA TODAY also found that only half the hospitals given the survey had psychiatric units for people. They quoted Art Ewart from Sonoma County Mental Health Services said, "It's not unheard of for people to spend a night or even a couple of nights (in the ER)."






Originally coming may be a rather heartbreaking experience for the rest of the family. In time, good things in the form

SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY Possible Life Beyond Earth

What will happen to us? What shall we, as a human race do? Is there any alternative to the threat of global warming, or are we doomed?

Thankfully there might be an alternative; Europa gives us hope. Many scientists believe that the moon of Jupiter, Europa, may have an atmosphere very much like our own Earth which could open the door to new possibilities. However, Earth may know very little about this moon, or the information it holds.

Europa, which was first discovered on January 7, 1610 by Galileo Galilei, who



named it Europa after Zeus' lover and daughter of the King of Tyre, is one of the four largest moons of Jupiter, rates sixth out of the sixteen in proximity, and fourth in

size. The Galileo, a spacecraft that received data giving us the closest views of this "icy" moon, was our main source of information until it was destroyed by Jupiter's atmosphere in a controlled entry on September 21, 2003.

Europa may have water under what has been identified as a surface of ice. This surface layer of ice is approximately 50 to 100 miles deep. The center or the molten core, might actually warm the ocean by deep sea vents very much like our "black smokers."

Surprisingly Europa has an atmosphere which is completely made up of Oxygen. This atmosphere however, is not produced the same way that we know on Earth. The Atmosphere is kept up by particles that are charged, hitting the icy surface to produce water vapor; it then splitting into Oxygen and Hydrogen. The Hydrogen eventually escapes the atmosphere, leaving only Oxygen behind.

Therefore the question is, does this satellite have a possibility of sustaining a human future?

Sadly, the answer is no, according to William B. McKinnon, Professor of Earth and Planetary Sciences at the Department of Earth and Planetary Sciences and McDonnell Center for the Space Sciences, at Washington University.

Although the Hubble Space Telescope detected the Oxygen on Europa, "it's atmosphere is a vacuum," explained McKinnon. Though scientists believed that






Europa could be an alternative place of living, its radiation levels are too high, and terrains are not livable.


There is another similarity to Earth; an interior of rock and metal. Though this moon is not livable, there is an ocean deep under the ice in which simple life might exist. The possibility of human life however, seems all too unreal.

Future of Computer Performance

Technology seems to be advancing so fast nowadays that in just a few months a "highend" computer component may be considered outdated and worthless. This is a mixed blessing – it means that people can be assured that the technology available to them will continually improve, but at the same time, manufacturers of computer parts spend more time releasing slightly improved versions of their older technology rather

than investing the time, effort, and capital required to create marginally better products. Perhaps technology wouldn't become as outdated as easily as it does now, and advancements would have more noticeable increases in performance, functionality, and stability. Two components in particular seem to get more easily outdated than anything else – processors and graphics cards.

For those unfamiliar with the term "graphics card," it is a computer component containing a graphics processing unit, video memory, some form of cooling, such as a heatsink and fan, and an output to a display such as a monitor or projector. Its purpose is to render graphics, hence its name. Not all computers have graphics cards; in fact, a majority of them simply have

integrated graphics chips on their motherboards. However, having a physical card with a dedicated processor and cooling system is marginally better performance-wise. Good video cards are required to play certain 3D games which are demanding of a computer's resources. They help take the load off of the main central processing unit so that it may perform better.

Presidential Elections; McCain Versus Obama



Darfur, half a world away, and yet the toll seems to affect us here, with 400,000 dead and more than 2.5 million displaced; genocide. The UN says that the death toll might be severely underestimated by up to 50%.

A lot of the conflict may stem from the rebel groups rising and accusing the government of oppressing non-Arabs, after the Arab supremacy rise in the government. There was a lot of change in the government, with people being overthrown and others coming back out of exile into the country.

It did not help when there was a major famine that killed an estimated 95,000 out of the 3.1 million population, among which already existed a lot of civil unrest. In an environment where non-native groups

have gained power, both native and nonnative groups are struggling to meet survival needs.

Although there are rebel groups like the Sudan Liberation Movement, and

eventually returns to normal. One example of this was the Little Ice Age, which lasted from around 1250 to 1650. The Earth cooled off dramatically, but after a few hundred years, its heat evened out again.

Professionals in the field of science have observed certain patterns in solar activity and the levels of Co2 in the atmosphere which surprisingly indicate that the Earth warms before carbon levels rise. This is because when the Earth's orbit around the sun changes and solar cycles intensify, the Earth heats up, and oceans release carbon from their depths which would otherwise be too cold and heavy to rise up to the surface. However, carbon emissions are not quite as detrimental to the environment as many people like to think. Contrary to popular belief, global warming is not mainly caused by humans. There's no doubt that humans definitely contribute to it, but the degree to which they affect it is disputable.

The short documentary, *Unstoppable* provides information regarding global warming and how the sun contributes to heat fluctuations, and does not feature any biased, opinionated politicians, whereas *An Inconvenient Truth* does, and is the antithesis of the aforementioned film. Al Gore has used his political stance to gain leverage in the scientific community and has swayed some people to change their statistics in order to make it seem as if global warming is really as bad as he wants to make it seem.

What appears to be the most likely reason why people tend to believe that it is our fault that the Earth is warming up is because of their naïveté and willingness to believe any political propaganda spewed out by biased individuals who manipulate the general public to benefit themselves. In this case, many researchers

of global warming state that Earth is getting warmer and that this is a cause for concern because they want to continually receive funds for "research" of this subject, and for alternative energy sources which are more environmentally friendly. Most people do not realize that they have ulterior motives for continuing to support global warming awareness and activism.

Aside from wanting to stop global warming, there are additional reasons for wanting to go "green," such as not wanting to be dependent on the Middle East for fossil fuel which has been greatly increasing in cost over the past few years. However, using corn ethanol as an additive to fuel has resulted in an increase in the price of corn and corn-based food products, which negatively affects the nation as a whole. The intention of trying to come up with alternate fuel sources may be noble, but in reality, it's not practical, and most alternatives won't work.


