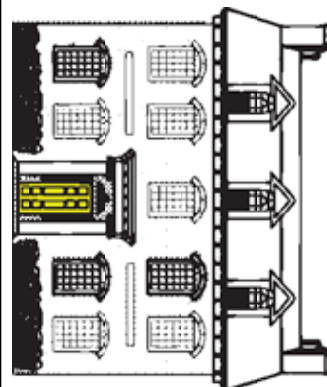
are *Avatar*, which was released on December 18th 2009, and, *Alice in Wonderland*, which was released on March 5th 2010.

# PIIGS: European Sovereign Debt Crisis

Greece is currently embroiled in an alarming sovereign debt crisis due to years of spending beyond its means. The government has borrowed too much money and is in risk of defaulting on its loans. Greece has a

debt of about 300 billion euros (\$419bn; 259bn pounds). Greece joined the euro in 2001 and which gave it access to international markets, but its current debt is threatening to destabilize the euro. Greece needs to refinance a

large portion of its debt or risk defaulting on its loans, which would threaten the credibility of the eurozone economy.

Greece is not the only country with financial problems. At least four other countries are in a considerably worsening position that's threatening the stability of the euro. This group consists of Portugal, Ireland, Italy, Greece, and Spain which has led some analysts to refer to them with the unflattering acronym, PIIGS, with each of the letters standing in for the respective countries listed above. Greece however, has the most dire situation of the five countries.

The other countries of the so-called PIIGS are still a rising danger to the euro that needs to be addressed. On March 24, Portugal's credit

The Healthcare Reform Bill is one of the most controversial things to come out of the White House in the history of large expensive legislature. Some people compare it to the scale of social security in terms of the impact on the United States, as well as the controversy it provides with it. There is much debate over whether the bill is good or bad, so here are some of the things it promises to United States citizens, and you can decide what you like or don't like about the bill in question. All of the benefits are taken and condensed for better understanding from Congress' healthcare bill summary.

The bill is supposed to provide Americans with affordable healthcare comparable to the quality that a generally healthy person under the old plan might have received. Part of this plan is to provide information citizens might need to make informed decisions on their insurance. The bill is claiming to make it easier for small

businesses to afford and acquire healthcare for their employees in what they call, "Insurance exchanges."

The plan is supposed to provide those in immediate

# Dangerous Earthquakes Shatter Communities

There were five major earthquakes recently. They took place in Haiti, Chile, Japan, Taiwan and Vanuatu. While places like Japan and Chile are prepared for major earthquakes because of their

building codes, places like Haiti are not. This is a potential factor for the major devastation in Haiti.

These earthquakes have been extremely powerful and there have been many casualties. According to *Science Fair*, a division of *USA-Today*, the scales of the earthquakes were 7.0 in Haiti, 8.8 in Chile, 7.0 in Japan, 6.4 in Taiwan and another 6.4 in Vanuatu. According to the U.S. Geological Survey (or the USGS), even though the Richter scale has no upper limit, these earthquakes were very powerful.

The two 7.0 quakes both hit countries partially on the North American Plate. This might mean that the North American Plate is starting to move. The recent earthquake near Chicago further reinforces the possibility that the North American Plate is moving. The earthquake near Chicago scored a 3.8 on the Richter scale.

Scientists do not believe that these earthquakes are related, due to the distances between them. According to Paul Caruso, a geophysicist for the U.S. Geological Survey, in an interview for *Science Fair*, "We've had quite a few quakes in the past few months, but not more than average."

The earthquakes have attracted so much attention because they have hit heavily populated areas. According to Mail Online, in Haiti, at the epicenter of Port-au-Prince in just one tent city there are over 60,000 homeless people.

## PIIGS: European Sovereign Debt Crisis

rating was downgraded from AA to AA- by credit rating agency Fitch. The downgrade highlighted the problems that the other countries have in front of them and the ever present danger of the fact that their economies would widen the scope of the sovereign debt crisis.

The Greek dangers to the euro are due to the fact that since 16 countries share the same currency, one's country's economic troubles affect the rest. Out of the 5 countries whose economy is threatening the eurozone, Greece is the main one that is actually a current threat to the euro because it has the highest deficit among the PIIGS with 12.7% which is more 4 times what the EU rules allow which is 3%.

Greece has attempted to cut down on its debts by approving several austerity measures to save 4.8bn euros. It had planned to freeze public sector workers' pay, raise taxes, and also raise gas prices. On March 29, Greece raised 5bn euros by a sale of government bonds to secure

more funds to help its debt.

The Greek population's response to the crisis has not been so strong. There has been some violence on the streets of Athens after a period of mild protests. However, it has gotten a bit better with the locals tampering down a bit in the past week. Katie Swinford, the sister of one of the staff of the Yellow Door Chronicles, lives in Greece every summer. She said that, "as an outsider (she) has not noticed much effect from the crisis on her life except for her grocery bill."

Greece has asked for help from the U.S. in stomping down on speculators that it blames for exacerbating its financial system. "Unprincipled speculators are making billions every day by betting on a Greek default," said the prime minister of Greece, George Papandreou.

In response Hillary Clinton said that the US wanted to help other nations to reform the "unregulated financial market that globally moves money at the

speed of sound, if not light, and leaves in its wake all kinds of consequences that governments have to contend with."

Germany plays a sort-of-leading role in the aid to Greece as its economy is the best in Europe, and Germany's chancellor, Angela Merkel, spearheads the attempt. Greece has finally received a sort of bail-out plan which was approved by the 16 members of the eurozone, and just needs approval from the remaining members of the 27-member EU. If Greece cannot borrow from markets, the eurozone countries and IMF will provide loans totaling about 22 billion euros.

The IMF will provide 1/3<sup>rd</sup> of the loans, and the rest will be by EU. The decision to execute the mechanism will be based on an assessment by the European Commission and European Central Bank. However, the plan is still only roughly a fifteenth of Greece's debts as of right now. Greece will still have to pay the majority of its debt on its own.

# Tea Party Protests Government

The Obama Administration is being challenged by the *Tea Party Patriots*, a rapidly growing movement of Americans against the Obama Administration and the government in general that was formed a year ago in response to the stimulus packages. At this point there has been no response from the government. Will the government stand up against their challenge or will the “Very Conservative” Tea Partiers triumph?

According to a recent *New York Times/CBS News Poll*, the eighteen percent of the people who call themselves members of the Tea Party tend to be Republican, white, male, married, and older than 45. Almost 9 in 10 Tea Partiers condemn President Obama’s way of handling his job in general.

Some of their goals, as stated in their mission statement are fiscal responsibility, limited government and free markets. They are opposed to the Obama admin-

istration, supposedly because of his policies on health care, the economy and the federal deficit. Their view on President Obama, according to the same poll, is that 80% of Tea Partiers view the president adversely compared to 52% polled overall. Also, the number of people who view the president positively is currently 11% in the Tea Party and 36% overall, with 11% undecided.

Though to some of us they may seem eccentric, they actually have a lot in common with us. They are just regular people using protests and demonstrations to make a point- they’re very mad at the government. They feel that the government is not representing their views and needs. The tea partiers are not only mad at the government they feel it is intervening far too much in their daily lives.

financial turmoil with some sort of relief should they require medical attention and are without insurance. Under the new bill, the health department would be allowed to intervene if “Unjustified, egregious premiums arise.”

More people will be eligible for Medicaid for all non-elderly Americans by raising the cutoff point to 133 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL), which means you don’t have to be dirt poor to be eligible for Medicaid. This also means more money from the government to supply these people with Medicaid insurance. Also, to help give more doctors incentives to be primary care doctors in the Medicaid range, payments to said doctors have been increased, which is, once again, more money from the government.

The goal and predicted result of all

of this is to provide healthcare to 32 million more Americans, which would put the total at 94% or all Americans. It is going to be entirely forced if you are eligible to get health insurance, which some see as good and some see as bad, especially when issues of affordability come into play.

So if you recall, it was noted that a lot of the money is to come from the government to provide these things. Well, the CBO (Congressional Budget Office) predicts this plan will actually reduce the deficit of the government by \$143 billion over the next ten years, and by \$1.2 trillion over the following ten years. There are a few reasons why this may be true. However, one thing that is most definitely true, is that your taxes will be raised in order to fund these new programs. Similar to

Social Security, you will be paying a little extra out of your taxes to support the new Medicaid and health-care reforms. Most of the tax raises

# Hoops for Help

Hoops for Help was a charity event organized by the O'School Community Service Group to raise money for victims of recent natural disasters, in particular, victims of the Haitian, Chilean, and Turkish earthquakes with the main focus on Haiti. Participants shot baskets, hula-hopped, and jump/skipped the hula-hoop as much as they could for 2 minutes from 2:15-3:00 pm and TLC (the Transitional Living Center) ran a lemonade stand for 30 minutes. In addition to donations for this, there was \$200 donated from Student Council. Altogether, the event raised precisely \$1203.

On January 12, 2010, there was a 7.0 earthquake which struck Haiti and had its epicenter a couple of miles from Port-au-Prince, Haiti's capital. The earthquake devastated the

city and the surrounding area killing approximately 230,000 people and leaving over two million people homeless. The earthquake is said to have affected over 3 million people.

Other recipients of the money will be the victims of other earthquakes that took place including the one in Chile which took place on February 28, and killed around 900 people, and the one in Turkey, which killed 51 people.

The Haitian earthquake was so destructive in particular because of the fact that Haiti is a very poor country in general and much of the population lived in poorly constructed housing that would not withstand an earthquake. Chile, on the other hand suffered an 8.8 earthquake which is a far more powerful than 7.0 but it only killed 900 as compared to

Haiti's 230,000 because Chile has a history of more frequent and powerful earthquakes that have better prepared them for earthquakes and it has architecture that is designed to withstand those types of disasters. A

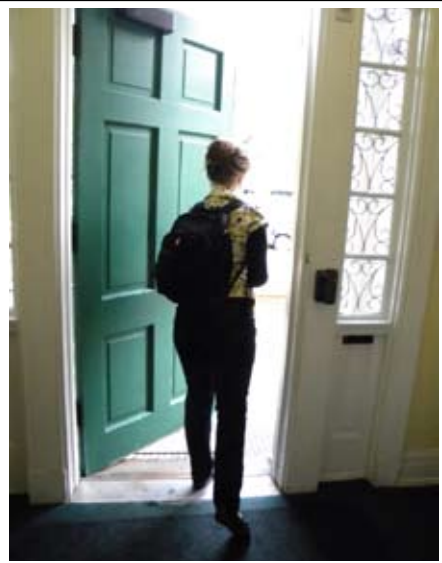
in the afternoon to see her daughter's, and others', presentations. Although for some students, their parents were unable to attend, with mothers and fathers from as far away as California.

## Hoops for Help

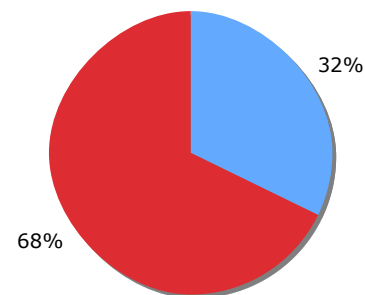

strong precedent was the earthquake that occurred near Chile in May of 1965. The magnitude was recorded as that of 9.5, which is the most powerful earthquake on record in history.

Hoops for Help took place on March 29, 2010, and was located in the Big Gym. 28 people participated, with mostly students involved. The "hooping" part took place from 2:15 to 3:00. Mirielle Craven and Megan Harlow organized and orchestrated the event. This event was the O-school's charity response to Haiti. The American Red Cross has raised \$409 million for Haiti as of their 3 month progress report. They also have handed out tarps, tents and toolkits to nearly 373, 000 people, provided relief items for 400,000 people, distributed 60 million liters of clean drinking water, built more than 1,300 latrines, and registered more than 28,400 people with missing loved ones on its family linking web site. The money contributed to this will go towards continuing these efforts and everyone who participated had fun!

Since spring training games take place starting in early March, many teams have their games held in warmer climates. Most teams have their games in Arizona, but some teams practice in Nevada and California as well.



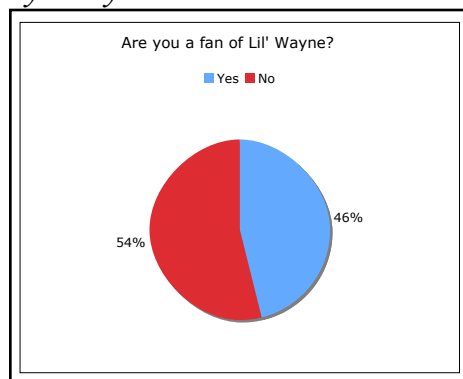

According to a *People Magazine* interview with one of the Rikers Island Guards, while serving his sentence Lil Wayne will be living among the general population of inmates. Many previous stars have been con-
